

A Message from Rabbi Ronald M. Shapiro



It is with great pleasure that I announce that Dr. Jason Kalman, Assistant Professor of Classical Hebrew Literature and Interpretation at the Cincinnati School of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, will be delivering the Ethel and Norman Gill Scholar-in-Residence lectures, October 21-23, 2011. Dr. Kalman received his Ph.D. from the Department of

Jewish Studies at McGill University and is a research fellow affiliated with the University of the Free State, South Africa. He specializes in the history of Jewish biblical exegesis and his specific research interest includes medieval intellectual history as reflected in biblical commentary and biblical interpretation after the Holocaust. He has written the book: *Canada's Big Biblical Bargain: How McGill University Bought the Dead Sea Scrolls* (McGill-Queen's University Press, May 2010). In addition, he has written many articles which are in print. His particular interest and expertise is the Book of Job, which is found in the third section of the Bible, the section known as The Writings.

Dr. Kalman will be delivering three lectures pertaining to that very significant book of the Bible. You may recall that Rabbi Harold S. Kushner's book, *When Bad Things Happen To Good People*, was based also on the Book of Job. Within that book, the eternal and anguishing question is asked by people: Why has this painful, devastating situation occurred? Why do bad things happen to innocent people? Therefore, Dr. Kalman has entitled his lecture series: *Why me? Unreasonable Answers to a Reasonable Question: Jewish Responses to the Book of Job*.



The three part series will begin with session one during the Friday evening Shabbat service on Friday, October 21st at 7:45 p.m. Dr. Kalman's topic for the lecture will be "Session one: Pointing the finger: How the Rabbis read the Book of Job and what it means for a Jewish understanding of personal and communal suffering". Following the service and lecture, will be a beautiful oneg in Klurflud Hall.

Part two of the series will be on Saturday, October 22nd beginning at 8:30 a.m. in lieu of Torah Study. Session two

is entitled *Playing the Blame Game: How Medieval Jewish Philosophers and Mystics read the Book of Job and its Implication for Understanding Divine Justice*. This session will take place in Kesselman Chapel with a light bagel breakfast.

Concluding our Ethel and Norman Gill Memorial Lecture weekend will be the final session "When Blaming the Victim No Longer Works: Jewish Readers of the Book of Job in the Wake of the Holocaust. This session will be held Sunday, October 23rd from 9:45 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in Kesselman Chapel as the first of the year's Sunday Forums.

Norman and Ethel Gill were highly intelligent and devoted members of our Jewish community, and for many years the Gill family has brought outstanding and dynamic scholars to Congregation Shalom and to Milwaukee in order to fulfill the mitzvah of education. Please join us at temple for inspiring learning as we continue to explore the essential questions asked and discussed by humanity. We are fortunate to have this extraordinary opportunity of learning from one of the Jewish community's most outstanding scholars, Dr. Jason Kalman.



It gives me great pleasure, as well to announce that Dr. Jan Katzew will be our Scholar in Residence for the Sanford Ettinger Memorial Lecture weekend on November 11th-13th. Dr. Katzew is the Director of Lifelong Jewish Learning for the Union for Reform Judaism, which enables him to perpetuate his mission to bring the splendor of Jewish teaching to the souls of all his students. Dr.



Katzew was ordained a rabbi in 1983 at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Cincinnati, Ohio, and served Community Synagogue of Port Washington, New York from 1983-1991. In addition, he received his Ph.D. in Education and Jewish Thought from the Hebrew University, Jerusalem, Israel. He has extensive teaching experience and as received many honors and awards for his scholarship, and dynamic teaching. In addition, Rabbi Katzew's work and article have been published in numerous publications.

Rabbi Katzew will be speaking on the topic, "Choose Life" at the Friday Shabbat service on November 11th at 7:45 p.m. The topic "Choose Life" deals with the premise that our attitude

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI NOAH CHERTKOFF



During my first year of rabbinical school in Jerusalem, several of my classmates and I set out on a journey to the Negev desert in Egypt for a brief vacation during the holiday of Sukkot. As we crossed the border into Egypt in Eilat and continued further south, civilization as we know it began to creep away. Finally we came to our camp between Nueva and Dahab

alongside the Red Sea. Staring out at the miles of brownish red dirt and light blue of the water, set against straw huts for us to sleep comfortably within, we recognized that we had entered into a different space and time. Before starting rabbinical school I had worked in a high stress job for the government and had little time to think. Fax machines, cell phone rings, and the sounds of frantic meetings were the rhythms I moved to in my life. This empty space filled with ocean, sand, sky, and silence stood in stark contrast to my past and certainly to my future as well. It was into this empty silent place, devoid of structure, that this group of people began to fill the time together. We shared stories; we laughed and felt connected to things greater than ourselves. It was in this undefined space that we found each other and built lasting friendships. Our Jewish holidays remind us that we are engaged in acts of creation. Sometimes these acts are physical, like traveling to far flung places or constructing a sukkah (booth) to remind us of the history of our people and sometimes these acts are a spiritual construction of space and time to let in our loved ones and friends who we haven't even met yet.

We are so fortunate to have places in our community to forge and maintain these relationships, particularly for our younger members, through our religious schools and youth groups. Our youth groups are kicking into high gear and we are so excited to welcome back seasoned Youth Group advisors and new additions to the team. Brad and Becky Dallet (our Club 34 Advisors) will be returning to work with our youngest youth groupers and Talia Schumacher is an exciting new addition to our staff as our SPFY advisor (7th and 8th grade). Geri Berg will be returning as our Club 56 advisor as well as an advisor for our Senior Youth Group (SHFTY). I'm also thrilled to welcome a long time member of our congregation and former SHFTYite, Jacquelyn Wahlberg who will be co-advisor with Geri Berg for SHFTY. We have a wonderful year of youth group activities ahead of us in which our young people can create a sense of shelter and companionship.

If you are an adult and long for the type of connections that were formed with your peers in your youth, please avail yourself of the many different possible entry points to community in our congregation. Study Torah on Saturday mornings and nurture your soul, join our Sisterhood and make wonderful new friends, create or join a Chavurah, attend an Adult Ed Program; there are so many way to connect at our Temple!

It is amidst the chaos of everyday life that we must construct our fragile *sukkah*, to fully experience the truly important

1. Abortion, and if the present law of Roe vs. Wade was changed or modified, what implications await?
2. Dementia and Alzheimer’s Disease—How do we respond to this growing problem?
3. Other related medical ethic issues, such as a responsa which asks a question pertaining to performing surgery on a 96-year-old person, and such issues about end of life decision making.

5. The complexion of the Jewish community today, and how Judaism will look in the future, now that we fulfilled Isaiah’s admonition: “Stretch your tent as wide as you can”. Now that our tent is stretched wide and thankfully a wide variety of cultures and religions are included within our community, how will Judaism respond to the confluence of cultural and religious differences?

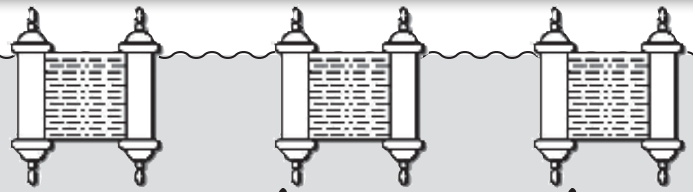


Yom Kippur Study Session with Dr. Richard Lux

Please join us for the Yom Kippur study session on **Saturday, October 8th at 2:15 p.m.** in Klurfeld Hall. We are excited to welcome Dr. Richard Lux, Emeritus Professor of Scripture Studies at Sacred Heart School of Theology.

He will lead a discussion entitled *Christian-Jewish Relations: From a Messianic Sect to the "Teaching of Contempt" to Reconciliation*. He'll be speaking about Christianity's Jewish origins from a pre-70 C.E. Messianic sect whose followers were faithful Torah and Temple living Jews to the hatred and separation of "The Teaching of Contempt" to the 20th century's radical reconciliation.

Dr. Lux received his Ph.D. in Scripture Studies from the University of Notre Dame. For over 35 years Dr. Lux has been active in Catholic-Jewish Relations at the local, national and international level. He brings a new perspective to the issues of the people, land and State of Israel, having been to Israel many times, leading study groups and engaging in research there. He is currently President of the National Christian Leadership Conference for Israel, an ecumenical net-working group. The Lux Center for Catholic-Jewish Studies at Sacred Heart has been founded (May, 2010) to carry on his work. His most recent publication is *The Jewish People, the Holy Land and the State of Israel* (Paulist Press, 2010).
